In 1910 Abraham Flexner, an educator and member of the research staff of the Carnegie Foundation, published a comprehensive report of the state of medical education in the United States and Canada.

Modern patterns of medical education. As medical education developed after the Flexner report was published, the distinctive feature was the thoroughness with which theoretical and scientific knowledge were fused with what experience teaches in the practical responsibility of taking care of

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human beings. Medical education eventually developed into a process that involved four generally recognized stages: premedical, undergraduate, postgraduate, and continuing education.

Interpreting the history of medical education in terms of precursors of contemporary developments always entails the risk of constructing an anachronism. For most of history, the question of whether graduating students were “competent to practice medicine” cannot clearly be answered, as the whole concept of “competency” did not exist or existed only implicitly.
