When indicating the possessive, if there is more than one owner add an apostrophe to the plural; if there is one owner, add 's to the singular (The Smiths' car vs. Smith's car). If the possessive involves a last name ending with 's' or 'z,' you can add either. Special rules apply for classical and biblical names.

But although this rule seems straightforward, one thing that trips up many writers is how to form possessives when the name being used ends with an s.

Forming Possessives With Singular Names - APA Style

When we want to show that something belongs to somebody or something, we usually add 's to a singular noun, and an apostrophe ' to a plural noun. For example, the boy's ball (one boy) or the boys' ball (two boys). The number of balls doesn't matter, only the number of possessors (in this case, boys).

Plural vs. Possessive "S" - English Grammar

Possessive nouns show ownership. Plural nouns show a quantity of more than one. Plural possessive nouns incorporate the concepts of ownership and "more than one." Plural Nouns Ending with S. To show possession with regular plural nouns that end with "s," simply add an apostrophe at the end. Examples of this type of plural possessive noun include: Airplanes' wings.

Singular & Plural Possessive Nouns

Add an apostrophe and then the letter "s" to a plural noun that doesn't end with the letter "s" (children's toys, women's skirts). Add the letter "s" to the pronoun "it" to form the singular possessive. For example, "The company found its niche market." This is the exception to the general rule that a possessive takes an apostrophe.

The modern spelling convention distinguishes possessive singular forms (Bernadette's, flower's, glass's, one's) from simple plural forms (Bernadettes, flowers, glasses, ones), and both of those from possessive plural forms (Bernadettes', flowers', glasses', ones').

Words with irregular plurals that don't end in "s" are made possessive as if they were singular; that is, by adding an apostrophe-S. "There was a line to the men's room at the children's choral concert." Both "men" and "children" are plural, but they take an apostrophe-S as if they were singular.
